Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

As I write these words, we are well into 2020, and the presence of the COVID-19 virus has changed the way we carry out Christ's ministry, but not the ministry itself. The Scripture tells us that "God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, and entrusting to us the ministry of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:19). True now. True throughout 2019.

In recent years the numbers of worshipers viewing online began to increase significantly. Little did we know that our investment in audio and streaming equipment would become so important in 2020 as we "livestream" the good news of Jesus' reconciling work of salvation to you, and to many others around the world. Whether in person or online, worship through the first half of 2019 focused on the broad story of the Bible (with the help of "The Story," an abridged edition of the Bible). In the fall, we began a year-long study called "Following Jesus," focused on Luke's account of Jesus' life and ministry. Remember that it's only in Luke's account that we read the wonderful stories of reconciliation that we call the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10), and the Parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15).

Livestreaming is especially enhanced by the natural beauty and magnificence of our sanctuary, which is one of many gifts entrusted to our care. In 2019 we took great steps forward to preserve this gift for generations to come. For many, the year will be remembered as the year of the scaffolding, as the exterior of our 50 year-old building was lovingly cleaned and restored after the wear and tear of years, and the damage caused by the 2011 DC earthquake. It was also the year when behind the scenes, architects began turning the dreams created by our Facilities Master Plan into concrete plans that would facilitate the ministry of reconciliation in the days ahead. The 2019 work of Facilities Director Diane Stewart, along with our Facilities Council and Capital Project Steering Committee was remarkable.

Of course, the ministry of reconciliation involves not only the concrete places of a "holy space" dedicated for God's work (more than ever, our homes have now also become part of NPC's "holy spaces"), but the concrete gifts of God's people. In 2019, your generosity not only enabled the ministry to move forward "at home," but, as we shared our blessings (almost a quarter million dollars of capital campaign funds) with refugee families in the Middle East and Africa, as well as with vulnerable families in our own city.

What a privilege to share in leadership at National in 2019 with remarkable members of Session, Deacons, committees, small group leaders, and staff – all eager to model and spread the good news of Christ's reconciling work with you and with many in Christ's world. And how exciting to look to the future and think of what God will continue to do in and through National in 2020 and the years ahead.

WORSHIP AT NATIONAL

56 NEW MEMBERS

National joyfully ushered in 56 new members through Pathway Membership Classes, New Member Connection Sundays and Receptions, and a redesigned schedule. Each new member was personally invited to get plugged into opportunities for ministry and mission.

572 GUESTS WELCOMED

- 572 first-time visitors received letters of greeting.
- 173 Bibles and 430 Guest Welcome Packets were gifted.
- 1,650+ personal emails and calls were made connecting friends of NPC, congregants, leaders, and ministries.

In September 2019, National hosted **Neighbor Day**, a festive church gathering and community outreach event. The whole congregation and the neighborhood were invited to enjoy a delicious lunch from food trucks, and bring food for neighbors in need. Thanks to coordinated efforts by the Connections and Serve ministries, National found a new way to live out its calling to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. ... and love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-39)

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

Our **Youth House renovation** was completed in 2019, the first on-site project funded by the Capital Campaign.

Improvements included reconfiguring the main level to be fully ADA accessible, renovating bathrooms on both levels, adding a kitchenette on the upper level, and AV/IT upgrades. The fabulous new furniture was the final touch that made the space bright, fun, and welcoming for NPC's Youth. All of this was made possible by the incredible generosity of those who gave and continue to give to the Capital Campaign.

Significant projects sustained our 7-building, 12+ acre campus throughout the year.

The most noteworthy was our **church and tower stone restoration project**, which included a series of necessary repairs to the façade damaged by the 2011 earthquake. Construction spanned over nine months,

and included repairing damaged limestone panels, recaulking all the joints between the panels, and cleaning the entire building and tower. This work removed minerals that cause deterioration and reduced water penetration into the building.

73,500+ ft of façade was cleaned.

72 ft of stone was replaced.
8 mi of joints were sealed.

In addition to the earthquake repairs, our Facilities team completed several important projects in 2019 including replacement of the loading dock doors, as well as the kitchen refrigerator and freezer, upgrades to the sanctuary wiring for lights, and remediation and removal of the fuel oil tanks. We successfully applied for nonprofit relief from the Clean Rivers Impervious Area Charge (CRIAC), receiving a relief amount of \$5,900 per month.

DEMONSTRATING GOD'S LOVE

The Care Council began the year with a focus on developing clear strategies for mobilizing all care ministries and church members to actively care for family and friends of NPC. Their objective: "Celebrate and reinforce a caring culture and mindset through NPC's services, programs, training and activities."

THE HANDS AND FEET OF CHRIST

As active followers of Jesus Christ, regional teams of **Deacons** served in conjunction with the Pastor for Care Ministries to demonstrate love to members and friends through circles of care.

The Deacons focused on providing care for those in need and maintaining contact with those who may not have been able to attend church in person.

Other highlights of the Deacons' year included inviting previously serving Deacons to join in providing care, and creating an Online Region for NPC's virtual community.



The Care Ministry led the 2019 Lenten Vespers under the theme of "Jesus Cares."

SERVING THOSE WHO SERVED

NPC continues to support a very vibrant **Military Ministry** focused on fellowship, education, service and support for military members, veterans and their families, within and outside our congregation. It is open to all who want to support the military, whether they've had military service or not.

In 2019, the Military Ministry sponsored 4 events, all of which drew 60 to 80 participants each. For example, on July 27, Elder Glenn Schmitt led a private, customized walking tour of Arlington National Cemetery.

On top of hosting speakers throughout the year, the ministry sponsors an annual service project. In the Fall of 2019, they collected items for the Warrior Canine Program, a program that trains dogs as caregivers for wounded veterans. Training leashes, collars, treats, and gift cards were collected and given to the trainers who came to NPC to share about their work.

The ministry is led by Co-Chairs, Ginny Beeson, USN (Ret) and Glenn Schmitt, USAR, and includes Dick Pera, USN (Ret), Melinda Moore, USAF (Ret) and Dennis Burgart, USAF (Ret).

PROCLAIMING THE GOSPEL











From making sandwiches for those without homes, to filling backpacks with messages of God's love for children in need, volunteers continue to step up and serve as the hands and feet of Christ, as the Word of the Lord commands:

Every year, National hosts Mission Gifts for Christmas, a time of generous giving in the name of God's work locally and internationally. Support is raised for those ministering in the DC area, such as Central Union Mission and Unique Learning Center; for international ministries like Bethlehem Bible College and ByGrace Trust in Kenya; and for missionaries across the globe. National is blessed by the tremendous generosity of volunteers who share their time, talents, and hearts with the community in DC and around the world.

2019 was an especially impactful year for NPC mission partners near and far...

- National helped to fund distance learning programs at seminaries in Egypt and Colombia, and Dr. Renwick visited mission partners in Pakistan and Jordan.
- With National's support, Central Union Mission installed a new walk-in refrigerator to serve its Family Ministry Center on Bladensburg Road.
- International Association for Refugees, one of our capital campaign mission partners, completed a building for Kakuma Interdenominational School of Mission, a refugeeled school training pastors who will serve all over the world.
- Pro-Vision International, an organization led by National's missionary partners Ted and Joy Carr, was on the ground in Mozambique to respond to Cyclone Idai when it hit the region in March.

National fed those in need in our community with 5.900 sandwiches from monthly sandwich making, monthly food prep for Martha's Table, lasagna at Thanksgiving, and staffing pop-up markets in DC "food deserts."

This included:

- \$13,441 raised for One Great Hour of Sharing
- \$20,888 given to the Salvation Army from a special collection for hurricane relief in the Bahamas
- \$62,180 distributed through Mission Gifts for Christmas, and
- \$250,000 from our commitment to capital campaign mission partners in DC and in refugee communities abroad.









On May 18, 2019, National hosted its annual Great Day of Service. Members, friends and families participated in a day of service in and around the District. Projects included packing meal kits, reading, crafts, building a home, and more... but all reflected NPC's dedication to community involvement and generosity.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH AT EVERY STAGE

National is passionate about fostering growth at every stage of life, and there is no better testimony of such efforts than students and parents who are connected to NPC's Children and Youth Ministries.

IN 2019...

From "parent tables" in Stone Hall for The Story, to Summer Family Hour (8 weeks of study devoted to parables), NPC parents were equipped to engage with the Word of God and with their families. However, the involvement doesn't stop there: as always, children and youth experienced their own unique learning opportunities in the life of the church.

At Vacation Bible School 2019's "Power Up!" program, children learned that "God's power has given us everything we need to live a godly life" (2 Peter 1:3). Real power comes from knowing God and living God's way. NPC hosted 140 VBS campers, who were led by 45 adult volunteers and more than 50 youth helpers! Campers came up with team cheers and worked to memorize the theme Bible verse. To earn more team points, the 5th grade group learned and recited the memory verse in Spanish, French, English, and Swahili.

Isabel Afnan (9th grade) and several others attended **The Great Escape**, a summer conference for middle schoolers. "I am so happy I got to experience The Great Escape multiple times," she said. "It is an amazing experience to get closer to the youth in and outside of your grade and most importantly, grow closer to God!"

National's Youth Ministry sent 12 youth members and 4 adults to **Santo Domingo**, **Dominican Republic** for a mission trip where they collaborated with Foundation for Peace at an orphanage called Casa de Luz (House of Light). This was a meaningful experience for students like Noah Detlor (11th grade) who remembers how he "enjoyed working alongside the other workers and caretakers."







NPC pastors and staff are constantly looking for ways to engage people of all ages in the life of the church community. In the fall of 2019, National launched a new small group, The Roaring Twenties. From 20-somethings who were transitioning out of NPC's Youth Ministry, to college students that were new to NPC and the DMV area, young people gathered with their peers, leaders, and various guests to discuss the truths of the gospel in their lives today. NPC continues to nurture adult learning in exciting new ways each year. Over the summer, 118 adults attended the Sunday Summer Speaker Series for a vital engagement on timely issues pertaining to "The Future of the Church." In September, NPC began an in-depth study of the life of Jesus using Luke's Gospel, "Following Jesus-The Story of His Life and Ours." An average of 140 adults participated in three classes every Sunday over the course of 2019. They gathered twice in Stone Hall for Saturday morning All-Church Conferences. In April, National welcomed Dr. James K.A. Smith of Calvin College, who spoke on "We Become What We Love: How Our Everyday Routine Shapes our Life with God." Then, in November, Dr. Marianne Meye Thompson of Fuller Seminary, shared "The Story of Jesus-Then and Now."



35 parents

27 small groups met in 2019; many utilized the Following Jesus: The Story of His Life and Ours curriculum.






Annual Giving by Household


MAKING A JOYFUL NOISE

One of the most precious and memorable elements of worship services at National is the musical gifts of the numerous ensembles and their members offered up in song. From the largest organ pipe to the smallest handbell, the range of sound and emotion evoked by the instrumentation and performance of hymns are a lasting tribute to the presence of God in our midst. Beyond the regular musical portions of worship services, NPC is proud to welcome special concerts and events into its building throughout the year.

Music at National Concert Series concluded a busy and successful series in December of 2019 with an additional final concert in early January of 2020. Performances featured outstanding local organizations including Washington Bach Consort, The City Choir of Washington, Washington Master Chorale with the Children's Chorus of Washington, Choralis, and The Washington Chorus who rehearsed in Stone Hall on a regular basis. The American University Chorus and Orchestra and the Wheaton College Symphony Orchestra were also part of the concert series line-up. In addition to providing a broad range of outstanding musical offerings, these groups brought audiences of between 350 and 800 guests to enjoy and appreciate the acoustic splendor and visual beauty of the sanctuary and church.

Grace Chimes, NPC's handbell choir, continued to rehearse and participate in services throughout 2019. Rehearsing regularly on Tuesday evenings, the 8 to 14 member ensemble rang for morning worship several times and for the Jones Hall family service. It also participated in Lenten and Advent Vesper services. Additionally, smaller recital and audition groups regularly brought younger performers to the Chapel, including Friday Morning Music Clubs and many area piano and vocal teachers. The beautiful Steinway pianos were a huge draw to those eager for students to have the experience of performing on fine instruments.


