Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

2015 is slipping into the past, but leaves with us indelible memories of events that continue to impact our nation and world in the present: refugees in their millions fleeing from war and poverty, shootings in Paris and Charleston, trains and planes crashing, conflicts that seem unresolvable, changes in marriage laws, primaries that are different from any other in living memory – and a visit to our city by Pope Francis.

Week by week we gather for worship in order to bring our lives back into proper perspective: allowing God to remind us of his gracious and sovereign rule over our lives and over a world that at times seems chaotic. Together we seek the Biblical resources and fellowship we need in order to make our way through life with confidence and effectiveness as faithful witnesses to God made known in Christ Jesus. The Psalmist says it well (Psalm 42):

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea; though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble with its tumult.

In 2015 in worship, we added a new contemporary service in Jones Hall, beginning in the summer. In preaching we covered a wide variety of topics – from basic Christian beliefs, questions people asked of Jesus, and the lives of members of our spiritual family in the Old Testament, to God's call for us to "Say Yes to God" as we reach out, join up, and live generously.

Speaking of living generously, the response to the fall 2015 stewardship campaign was the strongest we have seen in a number of years: pledges for 2016 showed an increase of approximately 11%, leading the session to approve an overall budget increase of about 8% for 2016. Generosity creates a new spirit in both giver and receiver – thank you!

2015 was the first full year for us to implement the 2014 (five year) Strategic Plan. The five main goals are:

- > To Grow Spiritually Together
- > To Worship Together
- > To Proclaim and Embody The Gospel Together
- > To Demonstrate God's Love Together
- > To Sustain NPC Together

As you look through this report I hope you will gain a sense of our progress in each of these areas, and that you'll also find God challenging you to play your part in moving towards the goals. Let me highlight just two of the new initiatives in 2015.

Small Groups: It's clear from the Scriptures that God wants our faith to be deeply personal, but not strictly private: as in any family, we only grow as we interact with others. The growing small group program is a simply wonderful way to connect our lives with fellow Christians seeking to follow Jesus Christ together in this world. Facilities Master Planning Team (FMPT): One initiative that began in 2015 (and that will continue through all of 2016) flowing from the goal to "Sustain NPC Together" was the establishing of the FMPT (see p. 13). They have a large task – to review deferred maintenance projects, to assess changes to our facility that will enhance our ministry, and to see if there are ways to use our property more effectively to produce long term income. Their goal will be to produce a report by early 2017 that will lead us to pursue exciting and constructive change together.

My prayer for National in the year ahead is our commitment to individually and collectively say "yes" to following God's mission for our church: by reaching out with the message of Christ, joining in to grow and serve in new ways, and living generously with our time, talent, and treasure.

FROM THE CLERK OF SESSION

In 2015, under Dr. Renwick's leadership, the Session concentrated on the implementation of our 2014 Strategic Plan. Session appointed an Implementation Assistance Team to keep Session on task.

The Small Group initiative which began in 2015 touches on several elements of the strategic plan, foremost by helping us know each other better within the congregation. Session also tackled two elements of the plan's fifth goal: "Sustain NPC's mission into the future by updating NPC facilities, and enacting organizational changes." A vital step was the creation of our Facilities Master Planning Team (FMPT). The team has been meeting every two weeks or so since summer to identify the state of our facilities and our needs into the future. Many of you filled in surveys in to help the FMPT identify priorities for campus.

Related to facilities, Session agreed in December to a financial settlement of our litigation concerning our insurance claim for damage done by the 2011 earthquake. Making repairs remains a huge challenge in the year ahead.

To assist the Session with a comprehensive review of the organization and management of NPC, Session retained Susan Beaumont, a consultant known for her work with large congregations to align leadership and resources. After receiving her October report, Session held a retreat on November 13-14 to discuss its recommendations and also met with another church in the presbytery that had already implemented similar organizational recommendations. The theme of the recommendation is for elders to provide strategic

Session facilitated the calling and installation of Rev. Marsh and Rev. Taylor as Associate Pastors. NPC has never had four called and installed pastors before.

Session also ratified the recommendation of the National Presbyterian School Board of Trustees and appointed a new permanent Head of School, Malcolm Lester, who will begin his tenure on July 1, 2016.

Elders may serve up to six consecutive years under the Book of Order although they are ordained elders for life. Our thanks for years of faithful service to "retiring" Elders: Emmy Lewis, David Mack, Herma Williams, and Delores Ziegler. We further salute the dedication of our retiring Deacons: Nilanthi Beekhuysen, Carol Cadou, Marie Clausen, Colleen Flynn, Carolyn Gasarch, Mary Lou Lyon, Veronica Zeitlin McKenna, Jane Peterson, Robert Peterson, Dottie Rayburn, and Dick Tingley.

The Session is grateful for the prayerful support of our congregation. Together, we will "lead others to become faithful followers of Jesus Christ, together in God's world."

PRAYER

SMALL GROUPS - NEW IN 2015!

We launched a new small groups initiative beginning Lent 2015, with a second term of small groups taking place in the fall. Small groups gathered for 6-8 weeks throughout the metro DC region for study (mainly focusing on the past Sunday's sermon), conversation, prayer, and friendship. Twenty-three groups met in 2015, with more than 285 of our members and friends participating. More than half of the groups continued to meet through the remainder of the year.

CHILDREN

Sunday School

Approximately 70 children came to our nursery and Sunday school classes each week, led by over 20 volunteers. Kids learned about the love of Jesus and the Word of God as our congregation actively lived out the promises we make when our children are baptized—to teach them and nurture their faith.

Special Events and Milestones

Over the course of the year, each grade participated in an age-appropriate "Milestone" to teach them about our worship and liturgy. These were mirrored by Parent Milestones that encouraged and equipped parents to bring faith home. From July 6-10, 90 children attended our fun and faith-filled Vacation Bible School.

YOUTH

Sunday School

Over 45 youth (from 6th to 12th grade) attended Sunday school each week. Four ninth graders joined NPC as adult members as we saw the promises made at baptism come to fruition in Confirmation on Youth Sunday, May 10. Approximately 20 youth attended weekly Sunday evening youth group gatherings.

Special Events and Retreats

Thirty-five youth served as volunteer leaders in our annual Vacation Bible School. Fifty-five youth and their families participated in a Family Service Day in November preparing meals for NPC mission partner McKenna's Wagon. Twelve middle school youth went on retreat to camp Joy-El in Greencastle, PA from November 6-8. Fifteen high school youth went on a retreat (also to Joy-El) from December 4-6.

COLLEGE STUDENTS & YOUNG ADULTS College Students

We sent over 50 care packages to our college students throughout the country during finals week. For students in the DC area, NPC offered regular gatherings throughout the year.

Young Adults

On a typical Sunday, 10 young adults (ages 22-35) gathered after worship for lunch, fellowship, sermon discussion and Bible study.



ADULTS Sunday School

In 2015, there were many ways to grow in discipleship, including weekly classes and summer plenary speaker series; 520 adults attended at least one class or plenary over the course of the year. Sunday School classes took place weekly during the spring, fall, and January terms, with 230 adults participating. During the summer plenary speaker series, an average of 119 adults attended each week. In 2015, over 45 Sunday school teachers graciously gave of their time in Adult, Children's, and Youth ministries.

Special Events and Retreats

Author and *New York Times* columnist David Brooks joined us in May for an evening conversation about his best-selling book, *The Road to Character*; over 900 people attended. In October, Dr. Curt Thomson, a nationally known psychiatrist and author of *Anatomy of the Soul*, spoke at our fall conference on the connection between neuroscience and Christian faith.

Sixty women attended the spring women's retreat with speaker Rev. Glenda Simpkins Hoffman, and thirty-five men attended the fall men's retreat with speaker Jerry Leachman.



RESOURCES

NPC is blessed with an award winning library with two locations and a collection of over 16,000 books, audio-visuals, and other resources for Christian growth. Nearly 400 resources were added this year, cared for by a dedicated team of 28 volunteers. In addition, our well-stocked bookstore provided discounted prices on books for classes, group study, and personal growth.

INVESTMENTS

NPC utilized \$300,000 from investments to support operations. Funds withdrawn from the investments for engineering studies and legal fees in connection with the 2011 earthquake damage claim were repaid. The investment portfolio began 2015 with a value of \$5,546,000 and ended with \$5,456,000.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

In addition to the expenses listed above, \$73,935 of facilities capital improvements were completed, including:

- Audio-visual upgrades for the Chapel, and for Jones Hall in the school, to support the contemporary worship service and other functions;
- > Installing the digital chimes in the sanctuary organ;
- > Upgrading furniture for Elson Parlor;
- > Improving the chiller compressor, an important part of our heating, ventilation, and cooling systems.

FACILITIES MASTER PLANNING TEAM

Session assembled a new Facilities Master Planning Team in 2015 to explore our 12+ acre campus and provide recommendations for repairs, renovations, new facilities, and possible new income-producing uses of our property. The team has been meeting about every two weeks since summer 2015.

The National Presbyterian School

The National Presbyterian School (NPS) offers quality faith-focused education for approximately 315 boys and girls from age 3 to Grade 6. In 2015, NPS compensated NPC \$310,000 for space usage and reimbursed \$515,000 for shared utilities costs. NPS Head of School Jim Neill left NPS in 2015 and Interim Head of School Jim Hendrix joined the staff in fall 2015. The NPS Board of Trustees announced the appointment of Malcolm Lester as the incoming Head of School, effective July 1, 2016.

The Fund for Charitable Giving

The Fund for Charitable Giving is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization which provides a variety of planning and giving arrangements to assist individuals with their charitable giving. \$149,650 from the Proctor Trust was distributed for mission purposes through the 2015 operating budget. The John and Dorothy Shaw Trust distributed \$90,776 to four Christian theological institutions in 2015. Your long term planning makes a significant impact in the mission of our church.
