In 2015, the Session received a comprehensive assessment of the structure and management of NPC from church organization consultant Susan Beaumont. In 2016, Session began implementing structural adjustments to the Session, councils, and committees based on her recommendations. In particular, Session established an Executive Committee with authority to take action between monthly Session meetings. The goal of this restructuring was twofold: to empower church leadership to guide and assess the progress of the strategic plan, and to equip staff, lay leaders, and the congregation to be more agile in fulfilling the ministry of our church.

The Facilities Master Planning Team (FMPT) continued their work in 2016, meeting with stakeholders in the church to discuss their ministry needs and dreams with regards to our facility. The team partnered with Bill Krokowski of Requity Real Estate Group to provide guidance on zoning and land use. In December, the FMPT selected architectural firm Beyer Blinder Belle to develop the master plan of our property.

Session also changed the worship schedule slightly to accommodate younger families. As a result, a large group of parents now gather after the 9 a.m. service and have created new fellowship.

In December, Session surprised Dr. and Mrs. Renwick by presenting the "Dr. David A. Renwick and Mrs. Currie Renwick Married Student Scholarship" at Union Presbyterian Seminary in honor of their five-plus years service at National Presbyterian Church. Dr. Renwick earned his doctorate at Union while starting a family.

On behalf of the Session, I am especially grateful for the years of faithful service of our church officers whose terms ended in February 2017: Elder Sue Lockwood, and Deacons Eileen Doty, Mary Ellen McKenna, Ann May, Melinda Moore, Bill Morton, and Dottie Rayburn.

Thank you for your prayerful support of our church leadership as we pursue our goal of leading people to become faithful followers of Jesus Christ, together in God's world.

Supporting Families in Worship

"Wonderful that we can hear David every Sunday and follow all that you all do there at National Presbyterian. Wish we lived there to join."

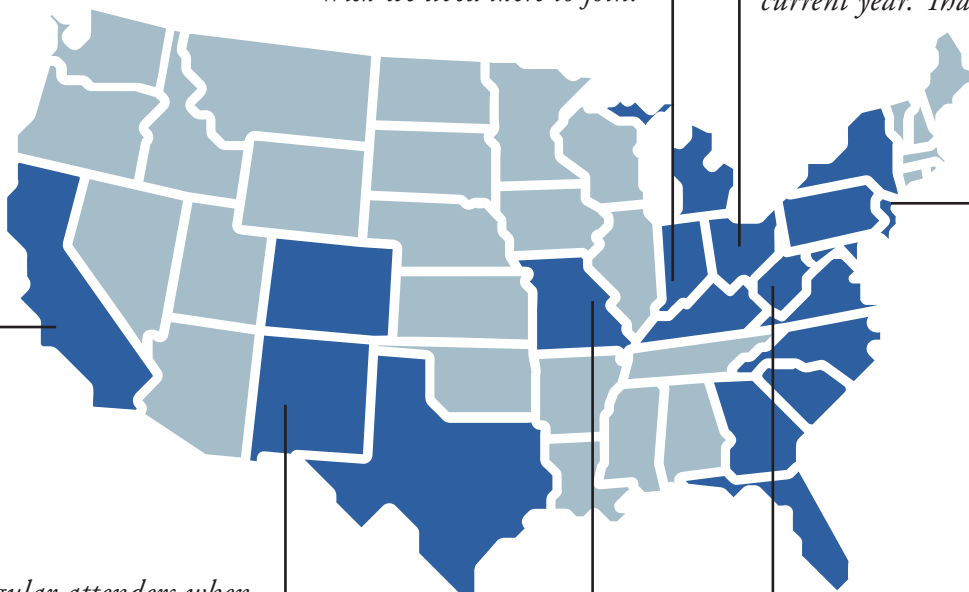

Deacons, Stephen Ministers, At Home Ministry volunteers, and pastors provided emotional and spiritual support throughout the year to members and friends of the church experiencing difficulty in their lives. The congregation cared for one another in prayer, during worship services of Wholeness and Healing, and through conversation and friendship each week with those who have attended for years, and with first time guests.

Reaching Out to Refugees

In April at a panel discussion held at National, NPC members, displaced people, and ministry leaders shared facts and their experiences of the refugee crisis. The panel provided a frame of reference for us to respond with wisdom and love to the millions of people who have been forced to flee violence and oppression.

Through service projects during the year, the NPC family packed a total of 700 backpacks full of necessities and school supplies for Syrian refugees in Lebanon. The congregation donated over \$10,000 for the backpacks, and through faith giving gave an additional \$22,000 to refugees and the displaced.

In fall 2016, the NPC Session approved the Refugee Family Project for 2017, in which NPC will partner with Lutheran Social Services to welcome and support a refugee family from a war zone in their first year in the U.S. We will have the opportunity to help a family to locate housing, enroll their children in school, learn English, find work, navigate public transportation, and settle into the community. We will be their friends and a key part of their support system as they build a new life.

In doing so, we will have an unparalleled opportunity to demonstrate God's love and grace, show what it means to be the body of Christ, and invite a family seeking refuge into our lives, our church, and our hearts.



Celebration in Mission

After working for over 20 years with Wycliffe Bible Translators among the Kaansa people group in Burkina Faso, West Africa, NPC missionaries Stuart and Cathie Showalter celebrated the dedication of the Kaansa New Testament in March of 2016. (*pictured above*)

Serving in the Dominican Republic

In the summer of 2016, a team of 14 from NPC traveled to serve in the Dominican Republic.

The team spent much of their time working alongside the Church of Psalm 126, a small Pentecostal church outside of Santo Domingo, to construct a new building for worship (*pictured left*). In addition, the team visited International Justice Mission (IJM)'s Dominican Republic office and helped Casa de Luz (House of Light), an orphanage for handicapped children. They also helped a medical clinic led by local doctors which saw over 500 patients of all ages, conducted Vacation Bible School for over 100 kids, and delivered sewing machines provided by the congregation to a group of young women who have been trained to use them to earn money to pay school fees.

"Each night we had a devotional and talked about blessings, including those we often take for granted: being able to drink water from the tap without worrying about getting sick; being able to go to a doctor or hospital if we do get sick, air-conditioning in 100+ degree heat! We also noticed how God had blessed our hosts to be a blessing. The joy they display during their worship service is palpable. You can feel the Holy Spirit's presence so vividly, and they are actively thankful to God. We felt the power of the Holy Spirit every day."

Engaging Families in Faith

When the worship schedule changed in September, an opportunity arose for parents. A new parent gathering now brings together an average of 50+ parents per week for 30 minutes of conversation and study before their kids' Sunday School ends; most of these parents had never before participated in an adult Sunday morning class.

Sunday School programs continued to enable children to engage and learn the Bible and celebrate milestones in worship. Vacation Bible School served children from our church, local schools, and the neighborhood. Families participated in annual events such as Advent Workshop and our family-focused worship services on Christmas Eve and Easter Sunday.

Relationships within our youth were built and strengthened through the high school backpacking trip and middle school mission trip to rural Virginia. As summer ended we bade farewell to McLane and Charley Stone, thanking God for their three years of ministry. In November we welcomed Kristin Franke, our new Director of Youth Ministries, who led fall retreats for high school and middle school youth.

Growing in Groups

Thirty-six different small groups have formed since our small group ministries effort began two years ago, with the majority continuing to meet. During 2016, 240 people participated in a small group outside of our adult Sunday School classes. Men's breakfasts, adult fellowship luncheons, and women's groups also provided opportunities to grow in faith and community. The Across the Aisle young professionals group grew steadily, completing book studies, volunteering at NPC events, and gathering off-campus.

Travelling together enables new relationships, deepening the sense of community in our congregation. A group of 30 from NPC travelled to Scotland in July for a ten-day trip learning about our Scottish Presbyterian heritage through history, art, religion, and local cuisine and traditions.

Engaging our Faith in Civic Life

In this election year, NPC provided opportunities to engage politics and government from a Christian perspective.

In January, *New York Times* columnist Peter Wehner reflected on how Christians can flourish in a culture that marginalizes faith. In September, we welcomed *Washington Post* columnists E.J. Dionne and Michael Gerson, writing from different "sides of the aisle" based on their Christian convictions, for a forum on faith and politics. Author Ron White and Pastor Adele Calhoun spoke in the fall, sharing insights on government and spiritual formation in today's world.

Summer plenary speakers, Sunday School classes, book discussions, and Bible studies covered a variety of topics through the year including Islam, secularism and atheism, faith and science, and more. These studies enabled conversations about the connections between our Christian faith and daily life and work.

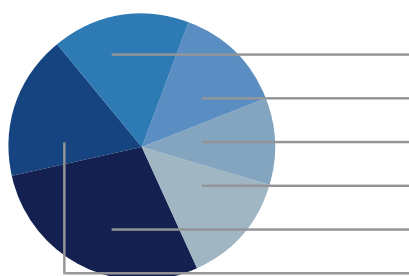

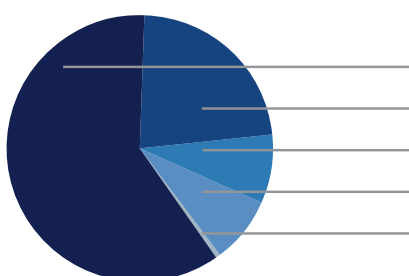

Operations

- NPC's operating funds net income of \$31,000 is roughly equal to the net income from 2015.
- Faith giving increased 3.5% over 2015.
- 2016 operating expenditures increased \$52,000 over 2015. In 2016, \$55,000 of operating expenditures was used for strategic additions in support of mission partners.
- NPC utilized \$300,000 from the investment fund to support operations. The investment portfolio began 2016 with a value of \$5,444,000 and ended with \$5,756,000.

Capital Improvements

Maintenance and preservation of the NPC facilities was a priority in 2016 with \$160,000 of capital improvements completed, more than double the prior year, including:

- Upgrades to the amplification section of the Sanctuary audio system.
- Web video upgrades to enhance the experience of individuals attending online, a population that grew by 30% in 2016.
- Restoration of the marble fountain in the courtyard.
- Maintenance and repairs to worn components of the Hopkins Memorial Organ in the Sanctuary.
- Renovation of the "yellow house," used as the youth director's residence and to host various youth events
- Initiated campus wide repairs or replacement of gutters, downspouts and roofs.
- Initiated replacement of boiler burners in the church building increasing the useful life and operating efficiencies.

In 2016, NPC was blessed by bequests from the following donors: George Bowman, Helen Holt, Leslie Miriam, and Ruth Paul.

Affiliated Organizations

The National Presbyterian School (NPS) offers quality faith-focused education for over 300 boys and girls from age 3 to Grade 6. Malcolm Lester began his position as the new NPS Head of School in July. In 2016, NPS compensated NPC \$310,000 for space usage.

The Fund for Charitable Giving is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization which provides a variety of planning and giving arrangements to assist individuals with their charitable giving. \$180,000 from the Proctor Trust was distributed for mission purposes through the 2016 operating budget. The John and Dorothy Shaw Fund distributed \$235,857 to six theological institutions in the developing world.

Thanks to the blessings and financial support of NPC's members and friends, the support provided by legacy and special gifts given over the years, and the dedication of pastors, staff, and councils in stewarding the church's finances, NPC had a solid financial year in 2016!

Facilities Master Planning

Five years after the August 2011 earthquake, the plywood barriers around the bell tower came down! (*pictured left*) Before the barriers were removed, engineers conducted a full study of the tower, removed loose stone from the fascia, and determined that the structure itself was sound and safe.

Further repairs will be needed to the exterior stonework in the future, but not on an emergency basis. A similar investigation and study of the Sanctuary structure was made and also determined to be structurally sound.

The Facilities Master Planning Team (FMPT) continued their work in 2016, meeting with dozens of stakeholders in the church to discuss their ministry needs and dreams with regards to our facility. The team partnered with Bill Krokowski of Requity Real Estate Group to provide guidance on zoning and land use.

In December, the FMPT selected architectural firm Beyer Blinder Belle (BBB) to develop a new master plan of our property. The FMPT and BBB will be sharing the designs for our property in 2017.
