As mid-2018 approaches, our family is approaching the goal of self-sufficiency. While these significant efforts go on, our more routine ministries are filled with life. For children, youth, and families, our ministries continue to provide firm foundations of faith and support. Through prayer, service projects, and increased support of local and international mission partners, we were able to bear witness to God's love and grace in numerous ways. Classes, small groups, and guest speakers challenged and uplifted us. Our 2014 Strategic Plan continues to provide vision and guidance for our Session as we worship, demonstrate God's love, proclaim and embody the Gospel, grow spiritually, and sustain NPC *together*. None of this can happen by ourselves alone.

As you read through the stories and progress of our church in the past year, our church leaders hope that you get a sense of the Holy Spirit working through each of us as the body of Christ. We pray that in these stories, you will find new and wonderful ways to "grow into Christ who is our head" by saying "yes" to God's call in your own life.

Focusing On Our Future

After years of research, focus groups, and study, the Facilities Master Planning Team unveiled their initial facilities plan to the congregation in the fall of 2017. Throughout September and October, the congregation was invited to attend a presentation to learn more about the plans that will serve our congregation and city well into the future.

The 2017 Facilities Master Plan recommends addressing a long list of deferred maintenance, improving access and flow through the church with new elevators and a central staircase, unifying the campus with new classroom space and garden access from the mezzanine level, and so much more.

In addition, two mission projects, one local, and one international, will be supported with significant funding that will enable us to say clearly what our church has accomplished for God in the world in a substantial way.

It is now our turn to take hold of this vision at National and lead people to become faithful followers of Jesus Christ...for generations to come.





Celebrating 50 Years

The roots of our congregation in DC go back to

1795—over 220 years ago. But on October 14, 1967, National Presbyterian Church marked a special milestone: the laying of the cornerstone of our current church campus on Nebraska Avenue. The move was a bold one. The congregation stepped out in faith, moving from a space-limited downtown location, to a multi-acre campus with room for parking and expansion of ministry.

On October 22, 2017 we celebrated their faithfulness to God's calling as we commemorated 50 years of ministry at our church home.

Over the past 50 years, thousands from the DC metro area have been welcomed to National Presbyterian Church. Missionaries have been sent throughout the world, children and youth have grown up to know and cherish the love of God shown to them through Jesus Christ, the Good News of the gospel has been shared with our city, and hearts and voices have lifted up to praise God in worship.

This rich heritage of worship continues today. When we gather week by week to worship God made known to us through Jesus Christ, we do so as a community of faith, fostering a welcoming, hospitable, and accessible atmosphere for all. Our worship services are consistently uplifted by joyful music from the Chancel Choir, Contemporary Praise Team, and the Grace Chimes Handbell ensemble. Beautiful floral arrangements given for the glory of God grace the church every Sunday.

Welcoming the Zeidos

On May 11, 2017, Sif, Laila, Ribar, and Rizan stepped off of their plane and into Dulles International Airport. There to welcome them was a group from National who had been praying and preparing for months for safe arrival of this refugee family. Less than 10 days after arriving in DC, the Zeidos celebrated Ribar's 10th birthday and moved into their new apartment with the help of a group of volunteers from National.

Over the course of the year, the Zeidos have been able to settle into life in America and gain the important skills, training, and knowledge needed to live independently. Our church family has lifted them up in prayer and stepped forward in service to make their transition as easy as possible. Dedicated volunteers from National helped the Zeidos locate and furnish their new home, enroll Ribar and Rizan in school, learn English and settle into the community, find work, and navigate confusing public transportation and medical insurance.

In addition to logistical and practical support, we have been able to share fun new experiences and everyday life with the Zeidos: trips to the zoo and to a soccer game, teaching Ribar and Rizan to swim and ride bikes, and sharing meals and stories in each others' homes.

In welcoming the Zeidos, we have had an unparalleled opportunity to demonstrate God's love and grace, show what it means to be the body of Christ, and invite a family seeking refuge into our lives, our church, and our hearts.

Engaging Families in Faith

If you could have one superpower, what would it be? Each week throughout the summer, parents, grandparents, youth, and children joined together for a new Sunday School program in Jones Hall beginning with a fun question that sparked conversation across generations.

These "Faith on the Big Screen" Sundays brought the gospel message to life by showing how popular family-friendly films express truths about our faith.

Mentoring Our Youth

Each year, new confirmands explore a deeper understanding of their Christian faith. This year, each confirmand was paired with a mentor to help guide and encourage them in their journey of discipleship with Jesus Christ. Mentors and confirmands met regularly through the course.

Youth were also encouraged in two new small groups, one for high school boys and one for high school girls. Between 5-8 youth met weekly in each group to discuss their lives and their faith, and to pray for one another.

Supporting Children

In our children's ministry, 4th and 5th grade are a time of transition—kids are growing up, and their friendships and connections within the church are vital as they prepare to enter our youth ministries and navigate new schools.

New Children's Ministry Director Cate McCrory recognized the importance of this time in the life of our children and expanded Club 45, a group of 4th and 5thgrade students that gather together to build relationships and connect with God through Scripture, service, and fun.

Younger kids enjoyed our new "Worshiper in Training" bags, full of fun things to help children engage in worship with their families.

Faithfully Embracing Change

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther changed the course of history when he posted his famous "95 Theses." Later, Luther summed up the central teaching of the Protestant Reformation—justification by faith alone (obtaining a right and permanent relationship with God through faith). This is the wonderful Good News that we still believe.

On Reformation Sunday weekend 20, as we acknowledged the transformational work of the past, we considered the changes we face as the church in the years ahead.

Leading us was Rev. Dr. Tod Bolsinger of Fuller Seminary, a PC(USA) professor, pastor, and author of the award-winning book, "Canoeing the Mountains," on how the church can best embrace the unknown future. Dr. Bolsinger called us to remember that one of the memorable challenges of the sixteenth century Reformation was for the church never to be static but to be "reformed, and always being reformed, according to the Word of God," even as we face a future "without a map."

Sunday School classes, guest speakers, and additional conferences reflected on the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, and what it still means in our church and our lives today.





Reaching Out with Christ's Love

"Love each other as I have loved you,"—this is Jesus' calling for our lives individually and as a church family. Deacons, Stephen Ministers, At Home Ministry volunteers, and pastors provided emotional and spiritual support throughout the year to members and friends of the church experiencing difficulty in their lives. Connections Ambassadors welcomed new guests each week with a warm smile and conversation. Thousands of Bibles and devotional book gifts were received by those coming through our doors.

In 2017, we began a new effort to better know and care for one another: "Known by Name" Sundays. On these Sundays we had the opportunity to receive communion personally, and spend time getting to know those in our church family.
