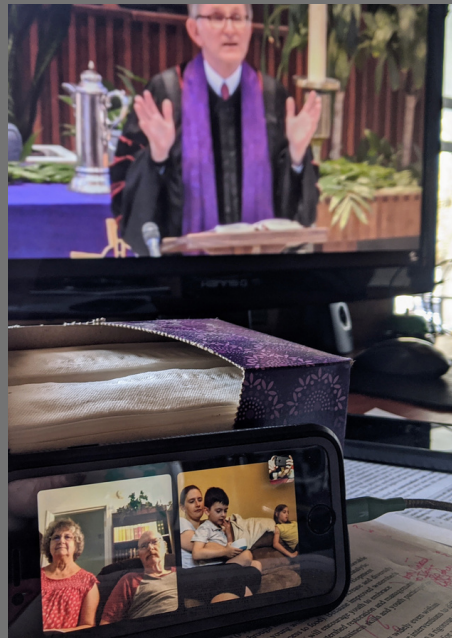

Covid Response:

- More than 1,600 personal emails were sent, over 200 phone calls were made and dozens of notecards were mailed in the first months of Covid, in outreach and connection to the NPC church family. Particular care was extended to our older population and those living alone.
- 2,500 friends of NPC received inspirational Easter screensavers.
- Increased online resources on our website, offering at-home devotionals, articles and stress tips.
- 1,000+ Christmas ornaments with a message of hope gifted to our church family.



Implemented Connect LIVE, our online virtual coffee hour, which takes place after worship every Sunday.

Installed "Prayer Pathway of Hope" on campus and over 60 prayer stones were made.

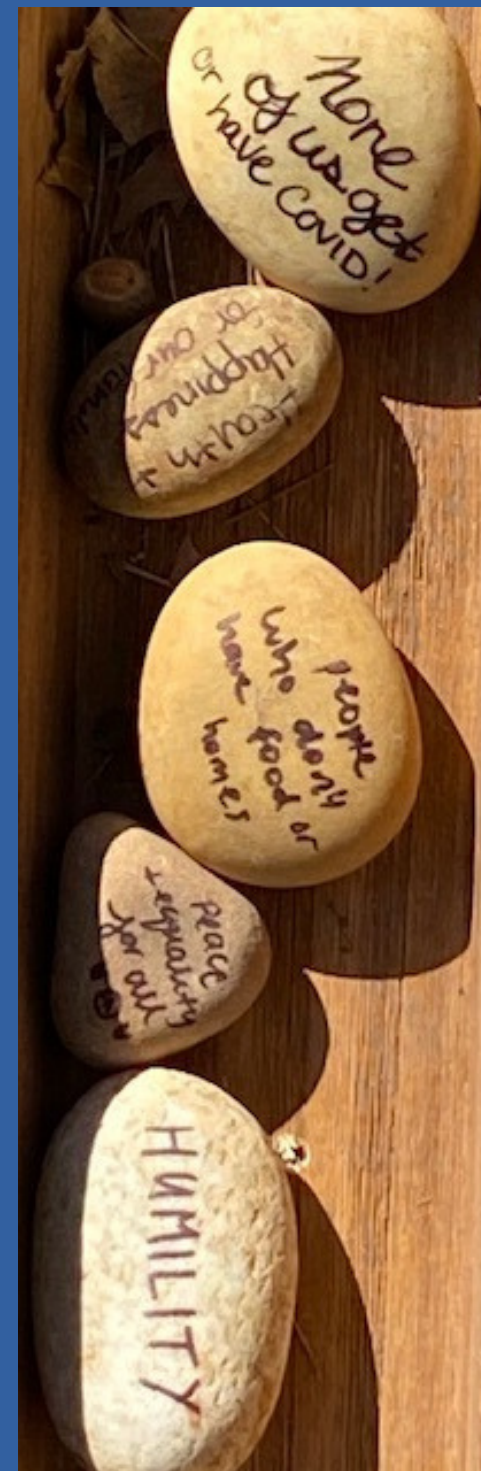

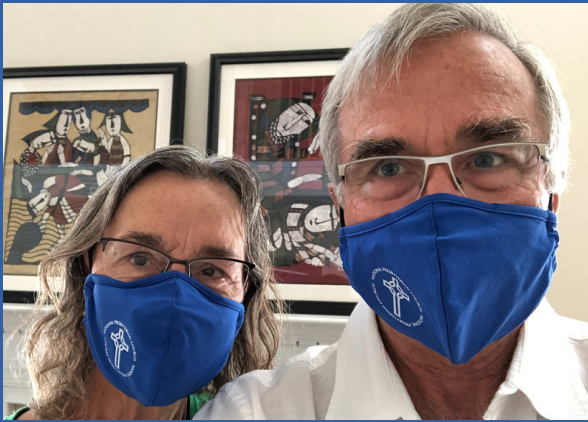

Worship can be powerfully transforming. It can help change us from the inside out for God's glory and our good. At the root of it all is doxology: Our words of praise and glory offered to God, and lives that glorify the holy, righteous, gracious, and merciful God that God is. This happens through every element and rubric of worship, including the music we sing and play together.

The last year has been one of adjusted creativity for NPC's music ministries. The pandemic has curtailed the gathering of the Chancel and Festival Choirs, Grace Chimes, and our Music at National concert series. Yet weekly worship has continued apace with a professional vocal sextet, occasional guest instrumentalists, and of course the stirring sounds of our magnificent organ. Every six weeks or so we also have been blessed by contemporary or blended worship, sometimes featuring NPC's band members.

Easter and Christmas have remained "high holy days" with virtual pre-recorded services carefully assembled from special musical moments from past years along with new moments from our more recent days. We all certainly do miss being together, but we trust that all these efforts have been engaging and edifying to our large online congregation. Each effort has been an offering from the heart to the Holy One who holds us securely, and who is graciously and sovereignly leading us into a future filled with hope.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN & CONSTRUCTION PROJECT

Early in 2020, as planning continued and permit preparation was underway for major construction, several smaller, but significant, building projects were completed. Four stained glass windows from our predecessor church, Church of the Covenant, were removed for restoration. These “Booth” windows, were located just outside the Parlor on the Sanctuary level, and needed to be moved to make room for the new elevators. They will have a new home in the building when construction is completed.

A foldable one-person wheelchair lift was installed in the choir room, which sits a half floor below the Stone Hall level. It makes the choir room accessible to everyone. Several marble coatracks were removed to provide greater hallway access and options for fellowship space.

NEW ELEVATOR ENTRANCE



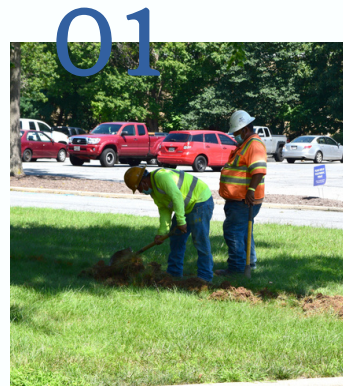
In July, our construction project began in earnest, and we celebrated our Ground Breaking on September 6, with almost 1,200 people participating “virtually” online. Early accomplishments included improvements in deferred maintenance. By the end of the year, our 50-year-old switchgear equipment and two boilers had been replaced, the stage had been removed to prepare for the future central staircase, and new ductwork was being installed for existing and new equipment.



PROGRESS TOWARD FUTURE GARDEN ROOMS

In the back of the church building, the new rear entrance was constructed to house our two new elevators. Adjacent to the parking lot, a Bio-Retention rain garden was completed. The garden, required by the District of Columbia, was filled with native plants and captures stormwater runoff from the parking lot.

Outside, in front of the building, the Sanctuary level plaza concrete was removed and a new waterproofing system was installed to eliminate water penetration in the building. Significant work in the fountain garden area began in order to prepare for the construction of our new garden rooms.

FACILITIES

COVID-19 Changes

The onset of Covid-19 re-prioritized NPC's 2020 facility operations plans, elevating the importance of air quality, strict health and safety protocols, and robust audio / visual capabilities. The facilities team quickly established procedures to cycle air through necessary spaces (such as the sanctuary), as well as maintenance standards for cleaning to prevent any spread of the disease. In March, when the congregation moved to solely online worship to comply with DC regulations, increased emphasis was placed on the quality of the broadcasts and audio visual technology to enable successful broadcasts to a significantly larger audience. This required upgrades to equipment and systems to improve performance.

Security Grant Project

Our Security Grant project awarded by FEMA in 2018 was completed in September after two years of continuous work. The \$405k project was offset by the \$150k FEMA grant. The rest of the project was funded by the capital campaign. Components included installation of all new doors, cabling, power panels, cameras, alarms and controlled access equipment for the Church and Administration buildings. The improvements enable National's staff to monitor access 24/7.

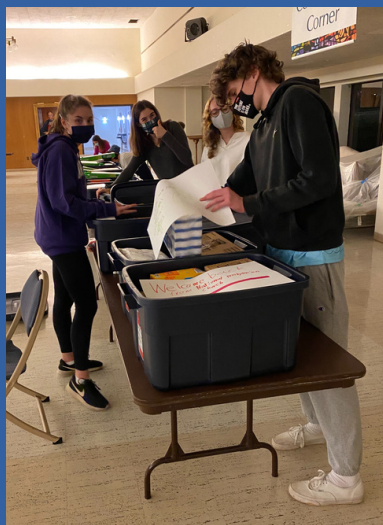
Other Projects

Additional projects were accomplished as well. Due to new FCC frequency requirements, a new wireless microphone system was required in the Sanctuary, Chapel, Stone Hall and Jones Hall. In addition, the obsolete, campus-wide telephone system (PBX) was replaced in 2020. Toward the end of the year, significant work began to improve the heating and air conditioning system and related ductwork in the Agencies Building, which is home to several staff offices, as well as classrooms.





MISSIONS



NPC MISSION PROJECTS

- In the early days of the pandemic, the church gave most of the gloves and lysol wipes that we would have used for sandwich making to Central Union Mission & Martha's Table.
- Club 45 (4th & 5th graders) assembled "Welcome Kits" for new Habitat for Humanity homeowners, including cleaning supplies, Bibles, and notes from the kids.
- Youth assembled Christmas gifts for Little Lights.

MISSION PARTNERS

- Our capital campaign partners did heroic work providing for refugees in Lebanon, Jordan, and Kenya.
- Mission Partner Friendship Place opened The Brooks, the Ward 3 family housing center, on Idaho Ave.
- NPC mission partners from Friendship Place to Wycliffe Bible Translators were instrumental in educating the church and the world on how to counter racism.

We hosted our first ever living nativity with live animals and both walk-through and drive-through options!

Our adult Sunday School classes were not deterred by the pandemic and concluded their study of *Following Jesus—The Story of His Life and Ours* online.

Meeting online enabled our Sunday Summer Speaker Series to bring speakers from across the country and one (N.T. Wright) from across the Atlantic! We took advantage of Zoom and YouTube each week for a vital engagement on timely issues pertaining to the Christian faith, including a month-long focus on the issue of race and reconciliation.

In September we returned to our four-class adult Sunday morning class format, all meeting online. The online format made attendance easier for some, particularly when the weather was bad.

YOUTH FORGED AHEAD!

NPC youth ministries did not miss a beat, switching to an all virtual format throughout DC's lockdown, with Sunday School, Confirmation and weekly hangouts continuing on Zoom. Though the summer looked different from a traditional year, NPC youth found ways to continue to grow in Christ and in fellowship:

- High-schoolers camped in West Virginia and dove deep into 1 John.
- In a Stay-treat at NPC, middle-schoolers learned about living by the Spirit and being Kingdom Workers in everyday life.
- High school student leaders met weekly with Club 45 and helped lead the middle school Stay-treat.
- Small groups met outdoors discussing how to grow in faith.

For fall, Sunday school continued online with a weekly focus on the books of the Bible. Youth Group met in person each week, braving the cold weather around fire pits. A small group Book Club met weekly to discuss C.S. Lewis' *Mere Christianity*.

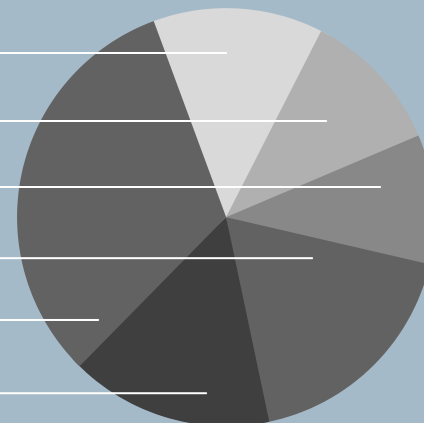

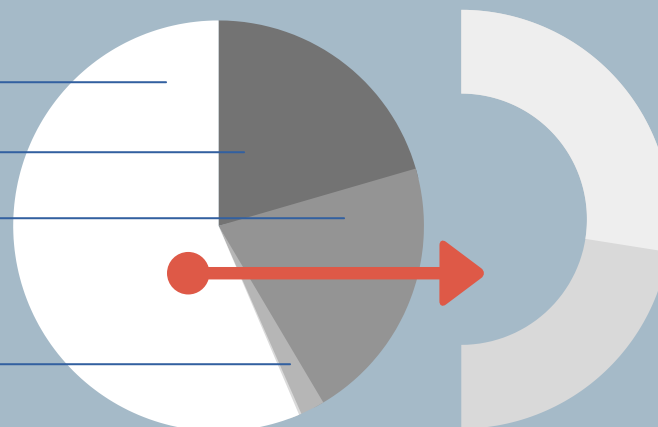

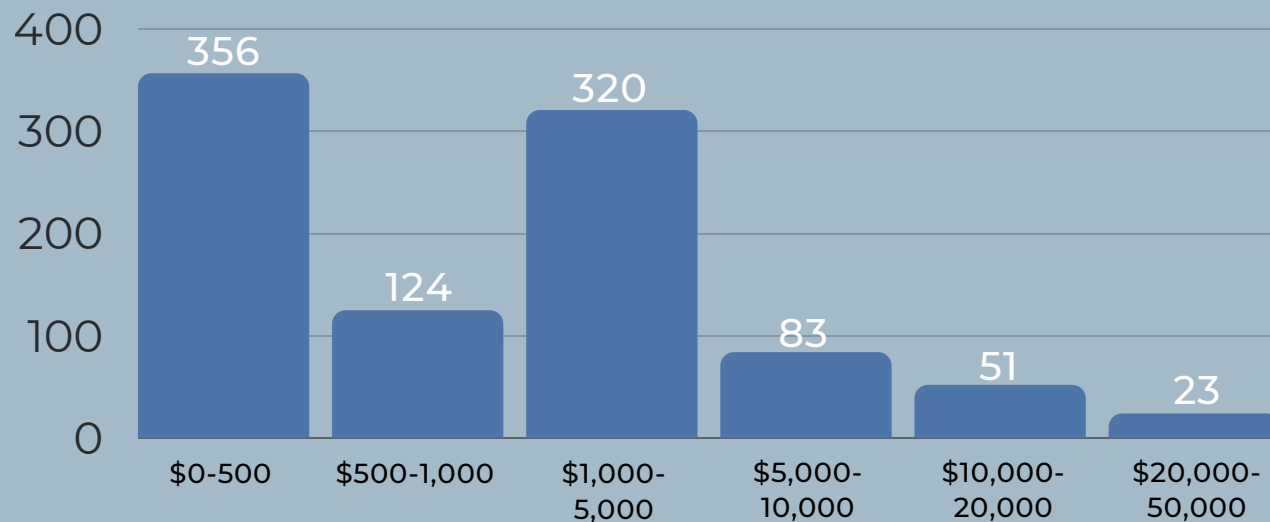

ANNUAL GIVING BY HOUSEHOLD

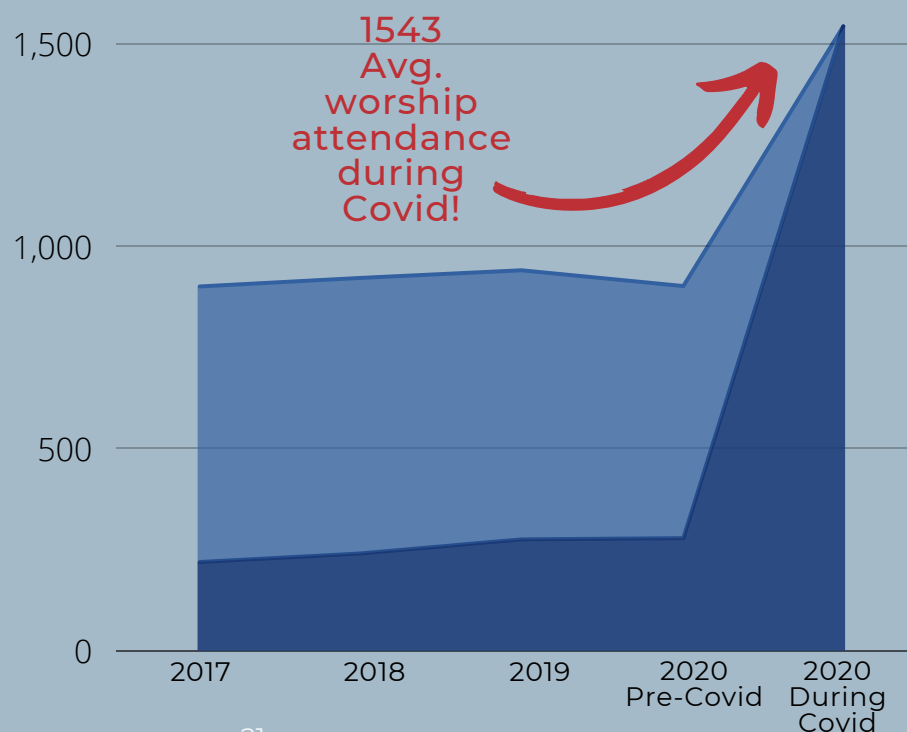
