We started 2021 in the same manner that we ended 2020, continuing with social distancing, 100% online worship and drive through events.







MUSIC AT NATIONAL

God's gift of music enables us in wonderful and compelling ways to praise, to pray, and to proclaim the riches of God's grace. Music conveys and communicates meaning which is at one and the same time intellectual, emotional, aesthetic, and spiritual. As Christians making music together for God and God's people, our task is well-captured in poetic verse of Longfellow:

God sent his singers upon earth
With songs of gladness and of mirth
That they might touch the hearts of men
And bring them back to heaven again.

2021 continued a prolonged period of creative adjustments for NPC's Music Ministries. Continued concerns about Covid and its variants still precluded any regathering of the Chancel and Festival Choirs, Grace Chimes, and our Music at National concert series. Yet week by week, music of traditional worship at 11:00 am was faithfully led by a small, professional choral ensemble, occasional guest instrumentalists, and of course the stirring sounds of our magnificent organ. Since last fall, a new 8:45 am contemporary worship service in the sanctuary has been beautifully graced by a piano-anchored band and several dedicated singers.

Easter featured an early outdoor worship service led by the NPC band as well as a brass quintet with timpani. This was followed by a virtual sanctuary service carefully assembled from prerecorded Easter music moments of past years and newly-recorded liturgical moments.

Four Christmas Eve services marked our celebration of the holy season: A candlelight crèche presentation; a renewal of the family service featuring children and youth telling in pageant the story of our Savior's birth; and two glowing candlelight carol services capping the evening.

With the New Year, we eagerly hope and pray for a robust return of a fuller menu of musical offerings and events in the life of our congregation. We miss being together. We miss making music for God and for you—God's people. Until and whenever that anticipated moment arrives we will rejoice in St. Paul's encouragement to us to "let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts," to "let the word of God dwell in you richly," and "with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God."

CONNECTING AT NATIONAL

Connections Happenings

- We hosted three Pathway of Christian Discipleship classes helping new members connect with ministry and mission as per their interests.
- We hosted *Connect Live*, an online fellowship group, with 40 participants, including a special *Meet the Pastor* event.
- We continued weekly outreach to "missing" folks, and coordinated follow-up with Care office.

- 97 Guest Welcome Kits given to newcomers.
- 37 gift devotionals were sent to new regular attenders.
- 30 personal follow-up emails were sent to online viewers watching regularly.
- 1,585 emails were sent to connect with congregants.
- Dozens of phone calls and personal notes were sent.

Care Ministries continued to care and pray for the NPC congregation as we entered into the second year of the pandemic. Phone calls and prayer were our greatest tool. Volunteers made over 180 check-in phone calls to touch base and see how people were managing with prolonged isolation and quarantine.

The online guest book became a place to share prayer requests and joys with Care Office staff and Online Prayer Team. Over 270 prayer requests were sent to the prayer team.

CARE MINISTRY HIGHLIGHT

The Military Ministry continued to be a strong and vibrant ministry in the Care pillar. In addition to making a monetary donation to the Afghan Refugee Resettlement Project, we had four excellent speaker presentations.

The Military Ministry also refurbished the four plaques outside the chapel that memorialize the 21 heroes from our church who died during World Wars I and II. Many parishioners had never noticed the plaques before as they were darkened and discolored due to age and weather.

CAPITAL PROJECT



Construction progressed throughout 2021 on the capital campaign project, culminating with the Renovation Dedication Ceremony on October 17th.



January: The year kicked off with major excavation in the front to accommodate our new garden room addition. At the same time, a project to re-route ductwork from the old fan room behind the former stage to other utility areas created space to connect the former north and south mezzanines.




February: Steel framing began on the garden room addition, and the installation of our two new elevators commenced. While inside new framing was being installed in the second floor central stairs and lobby, outside the front garden planters were being constructed.



March: After the garden rooms' roof was in place, work began on the outdoor plaza with the installation of a new waterproofing system and concrete topping. Inside, demolition of the floor in the Court of Flags was underway to make room for the central stairs. Cabinetwork began arriving on site for the new flower room and second floor kitchenette; and new doors were cut between the Narthex and upper plaza.

April: Precast concrete panels were installed on the new main entrance / elevator addition. The "bridge" from the main building to the new garden rooms was framed and sections of the central stairs began to be installed.

June: The Flower Ministry moved into their new space, and demolition began to remove the existing elevator and install new glass doors in the hallway to the Chapel. The Sanctuary level men's restroom was renovated.

July: The new fire alarm system's annunciator panel was installed, while outside, new concrete sidewalks were poured.

August: A gaga pit adjacent to the Youth House was completed, while landscaping in the fountain garden area and new entrance commenced. All room, closet, and emergency signage was replaced.

September: The Men's breakfast was the first event hosted on the new upper plaza, and the new garden rooms were initiated with the kickoff of fall Sunday School classes. New furniture for the Welcome spaces, Library and all meeting rooms began to arrive. Installation of the central stair terrazzo treads, glass walls and wood handrails began.

October: Numerous punch list items were completed to prepare for our Renovation Dedication Sunday on the 17th.

November: The front garden walls were cleaned and caulked.

December: A "facelift" for Stone Hall was complete, which included installation of replacement ceiling tiles, new flooring, and window shades, as well as lighting adjustments.

FACILITIES

COVID-19 Protocols

NPC's 2021 facilities operations plans focused on the necessary protocols required to remain operational during the ongoing pandemic and ensure the church's continued ability to provide robust audio/visual capabilities through the year. As DC restrictions were lifted by late summer, some congregants began to return to in-person worship, so it was critical the facilities team continue to monitor air quality and follow strict health and safety protocols. This included cycling air through occupied spaces (such as the Sanctuary), as well as deploying rigorous cleaning standards. Improvements in broadcast capabilities, including a new audio console in the sanctuary, allowed us to pivot to hybrid services and events and provide quality programs both in-person and online.

HVAC in Agencies

To accommodate the expanded use of the Agencies building by church staff and the school, new HVAC systems to serve the lower level and first floor of the building were necessary. On the lower level, an air handling unit (AHU) with new ducts and controls was installed. For the first floor, new valves and controls were installed on existing radiators and an AHU was added to provide air conditioning and improve the air quality, by circulating fresh air into the first floor spaces. The total project cost was \$140k.

SERVE









National Presbyterian Church continued to serve and give generously throughout 2021, despite the challenges of the COVID pandemic. The first of our monthly service projects was Super Sandwich Sunday, spearheaded by our youth. Members and friends made more than 1,500 sandwiches at home and brought them to NPC for our local partner Martha's Table, who sent them out on McKenna's Wagon for people on the street experiencing hunger.

The sandwich making event was followed by a massive food drive for Central Union Mission to help fill bags of groceries given to singles, seniors, and families struggling with food insecurity. For the next service project, we packed gift bags and boxes with personal care items for men and women served by the Mission. In May, we held another drive-through sandwich collection for Martha's Table; in June a drive-through baby shower for Laila Zeido (mom of our first refugee family); and then in July, a drive-through collection of 21 boxes and 18 bags of school supplies and snacks to stock the student pantry at the University of the District of Columbia.

We kicked off the fall with a huge community drive filling two Central Union Mission trucks with more than 12,600 lbs. of food and clothing. One October weekend we hosted the Friends of Forman board meeting. Friends of Forman fundraises for Forman Christian College in Lahore, Pakistan, one of our mission partners helping Christians and Muslims relate peaceably. At our Thanksgiving Day service, volunteers received and packed over 600 lbs. of non-perishables for Central Union Mission.

We rounded out the year with two wonderful Christmas projects, the first providing three gifts each for 50 children, a Christmas story book, and a gift card for caregivers identified by Prison Fellowship for Project Angel Tree. We were overwhelmed by your generosity and joy, delivering the gifts to 18 families in the city. The second event was Mission Gifts for Christmas, our annual Christmas Party, giving us an occasion to fellowship in person and to support 32 missionaries/mission organizations with a total of \$64,825.




Small Groups

Milestones in Worship

- Three new check-in stations were built, the necessary equipment was acquired and the software program implemented along with new check-in protocols for families. A volunteer handbook was created along with new training materials. We also augmented our background check procedure with a child safety training which more rigorously prepares our volunteer team and lowers the church's insurance rates.

LIBRARY & ARCHIVES



In December 2020, the Library and Archives Committee was divided into two separate functions. Additionally, Archives expanded its mission to include history. 2021 was spent moving into this change. Throughout 2021, the Library continued to function as an educational resource while Archives and History became a part of the Administrative wing of the church.


Library

After 30 years of service, J. Theodore (Jim) Anderson was succeeded by transitional librarian, Currie Renwick. Mrs. Renwick spent the fall working with the assistance of Willa Broughton, a veteran church librarian, and the library team to set up the brand-new library in the main building across from the Nursery on the second floor. The new, accessible library combined the collections of both the main library and the satellite libraries. Work also began on completely updating the online catalog, and selecting books and media in concert with the direction set by Grow Council.

Archives

Mr. Anderson, Archivist and Historian of the church, oversaw the complete reorganization of archival material in preparation for much of our collection to be sent to the Presbyterian Historical Society archives in Philadelphia, where these materials will be available to the general public through the society's archival records system. The committee continued to develop projects that will encourage knowledge and interest in the unique history of our church, along with its predecessor congregations.




