

Jeritage Brief

AN INAUGURAL BAPTISM

Most Americans do not know that President Dwight D. Eisenhower joined The National Presbyterian Church on February 1, 1953 by profession of faith and baptism, making him the first and only U.S. President to be baptized while in office. His wife Mamie, a life-long Presbyterian, transferred her membership at the same time. Because Eisenhower's deeply religious parents belonged to a Mennonite-related group that believed baptism should happen when the believer was mature enough in faith to know its significance, and because his life when he left the home did not lead toward any particular denomination, he had never been baptized.

His devout faith, nurtured by daily Bible readings in his parents' home and amplified by his need for God's guidance through the war years, and later in his leadership of Columbia University, is evident throughout his life in public and private ways. Yet it was not until the task of leading the nation fell on his shoulders, and he moved to Washington, that he decided to join a church. The decision to join The National Presbyterian Church was influenced by a variety of factors: several military friends who were members commended the church, including the pastor, the Rev. Dr. Edward L.R. Elson, whom Eisenhower knew from his years as an Army Chaplain, as well as people like former-Congresswoman Clare Booth Luce and the Rev. Billy Graham. Also, the Eisenhowers' son John had been a member of the Boy Scout troop sponsored by the church, when Eisenhower was deployed in Washington earlier. The church's liturgy, music, preaching, and the assurance that there would not be any kind of political pressure from the pastor led to the following remarkable scene, as handed down mainly from the oral history of Dr. Elson, pastor from 1946-1973 (Elson subsequently served as Chaplain of the U.S. Senate for 13 years).

Dr. Elson and the President agreed that the baptism should not take place until after he had taken the oath of office, lest there be any appearance of currying favor. Ten days after the inauguration, on Sunday morning, February 1, the President and Mrs. Eisenhower met with the Session. Mrs. Eisenhower re-affirmed her faith: "Do you re-affirm your faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, and in dependence upon his grace, do you promise to live a Christian life?" She answered "I do" in what the pastor noted was "an earnest and sincere spirit." And affirming the same question, the President knelt at the *prie dieu* (the kneeling bench currently in our own Chapel of the Presidents), and was baptized by his pastor, who prayed that the Holy Spirit "strengthen this thy servant. . . and daily increase in him thy manifold gifts of grace, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge," and more. Thus began a relationship with this church that lasted beyond the death of the President to the death of Mrs. Eisenhower and into the history books.
