2¹⁷ But if you call yourself a Member of God's Ancient people -- and rely on the Bible and boast of your relation to God, ¹⁸ and know his will, and determine what is best because you are instructed in the Bible, ¹⁹ and if you are sure that you are a guide to the blind, a light to those who are in darkness, ²⁰ a corrector of the foolish, a teacher of children, having in the Bible the embodiment of knowledge and truth, ²¹ you, then, that teach others, will you not teach yourself?

While you preach against stealing, do you steal? ²²You that forbid adultery, do you commit adultery? You that abhor idols, do you rob temples? ²³You that boast in the Bible, do you dishonor God by breaking what it says in the Bible? ²⁴For, as it is written in the Bible, "*The name of God is blasphemed among the Gentiles because of you.*"

²⁵The religious ritual of circumcision indeed is of value if you obey the rest of the Bible; but if you break the teachings in the rest of the Bible your circumcision has become uncircumcision. ²⁶So, if those who are uncircumcised keep the other requirements of the Bible, will not their uncircumcision be regarded as circumcision? ²⁷Then those who are physically uncircumcised but keep the other teachings in the Bible will condemn you that have the written code and circumcision but break the other teachings.

²⁸For a person is not a Jew who is one outwardly, nor is true circumcision something external and physical. ²⁹Rather, a person is a Jew who is one inwardly, and real circumcision is a matter of the heart—it is spiritual and not literal. Such a person receives praise not from others but from God. ³¹Then what advantage has the Jew? Or what is the value of circumcision? ²Much, in every way. For in the first place the Jews were entrusted with the oracles of God.
