In Colossians 3:16 St. Paul writes,

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God.

This is one of the key New Testament teachings about the role of music in both the public and private lives of Christians, but it is only secondarily about music. Primary is Paul's desire that the word of Christ – ostensibly teaching about Christ and teaching from the lips of Jesus himself – might "dwell richly" in us, among us, and between us.

"Dwell" derives from a Greek word for "house." It can mean simply to live in or inhabit a building, or more figuratively can refer to an idea, conviction, or even faith becoming stronger or infixed in us. It also can point to some sense of particular presence such as the Holy Spirit "dwelling" in us. "Richly" conveys the notion of "abundantly." If the "word of Christ" is "at home" in each of us and our community of believers, it becomes the basis and content of our life together and of our corporate expressions of worship.

In a parallel passage in Ephesians 5:18-19 St. Paul writes,

Do not get drunk with wine...but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts.

The enriching and maturing process available to us through reading and meditating upon God's Word is at root a spiritual one through the inspiring, illuminating, transforming, and enabling work of the Holy Spirit. We are not left alone. We are guided on our journey, and knit together in community, by the very Spirit of God through the invigorating Word of God.

It is not surprising that Paul's advice about the power of worship tethered to the recalling of God's acts and words should characterize it as a wise undertaking. The Psalter itself, Israel's great hymnal, and guide to millennia of worshipers, begins by pointing to the wisdom of "walking not in the counsel of the wicked...nor standing in the way of sinners...nor sitting in the seat of scoffers," but "delighting in the law of the Lord...and on that law meditating day and night."

Also wafting through Colossians 3 is the Apostle's instruction to "put on" compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, patience, and forgiveness; and above all, love, "which binds everything together in perfect harmony." For a worship service filled with music, this is key advice.

The flowers in the Court of Flags are given to the glory of God and in appreciation and thanks to Dr. David Renwick, the Elders, the Deacons, the Staff and the National Presbyterian Church congregation from the National Presbyterian School Class of 2015 on the occasion of their graduation held on June 10, 2015.

Take flowers to brighten someone's day. Are you planning to visit someone who is ill or home-bound? Take along flowers to bring some cheer! Bud vases with fresh flowers may be found on the table outside of Elson Parlor.

Today's organ prelude consists of two hymn preludes by Canadian composer and church musician Healey Willan based on *The King of Love My Shepherd Is* and *O Wondrous Sight, O Vision Fair*. "St. Columba" is an old Irish melody named after Columba, who introduced Christian faith to Ireland. "Wareham" is by 18th century Englishman William Knapp, who composed it as a psalm setting in 1738. The texts of these two great hymns respectively speak of Psalm 23 and of Jesus revealed in glory on the Mount of Transfiguration (Matthew 17; Mark 9; Luke 9; 1 Peter 1:16-18).

The English text *All Creatures of Our God and King* derives from Francis of Assisi's 13th century Italian verse "Altissimu, omnipotente, bon signore," also known as "Canticle of the Sun." St. Francis was born Giovanni Bernardone, a son of wealth and privilege. He renounced such position to lead a life of simplicity, contemplation, and service. Francis' grateful heart opened his eyes to evidence of God's hand in all creation. His words of praise are reminiscent of Psalm 145, "All thy works shall praise thee, O Lord." The hymn tune *Lasst uns erfreuen* is from a 17th century German Catholic songbook. The original composer is unknown, but the melody was harmonized for *The English Hymnal* (1906) by Ralph Vaughan Williams. This morning's festival setting for choir and congregation is by John Rutter.

Robert Lowery was a well-known 19th century pastor in the American northeast, lastly at Park Avenue Baptist Church in Plainfield, New Jersey. He wrote both the words and music of *Nothing but the Blood*, titling the hymn tune *Plainfield*, heard here in a contemporary setting by Craig Courtney. Its original publication bore the reference Hebrews 9:22, "Without the shedding of blood there is no remission of sin." Included in the original lyrics are his words, "Glory! Glory! This I sing, all my praise for this I sing – nothing but the blood of Jesus." They recall Isaac Watts' earlier verse capturing the Epistle to the Hebrews' theology of the supremacy of Christ:

Not all the blood of beasts on Jewish altars slain

Could give the guilty conscience peace, or wash away the stain;

But Christ, the heav'nly Lamb, takes all our sins away;

A sacrifice of nobler name and richer blood than they.

To God Be the Glory was originally written as a song for children by Fanny Crosby, who, with some 8,000 hymn texts to her credit, is arguably the most prolific hymn writer in history. Her many titles include Blessed Assurance; Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross; Close to Thee; and I Am Thine, O Lord. Blind from birth, and of meager means, she was nonetheless a friend and counselor to U. S. presidents and scores of pastors. To God be the Glory's rousing tune was written expressly for Crosby's text by businessman and composer William Howard Doane, many of whose twenty-three hundred songs were a staple of the revivalist team of Dwight L. Moody and Ira Sankey.

From a long poem on the life of Christ by 19th century Englishwoman Katherine Hankey ultimately came two favorite gospel hymns, *Tell Me the Old, Old Story* and *I Love to Tell the Story*. A wealthy benefactress and member of the Church of England, Hankey's evangelical fervor and concern for the less fortunate compelled her into teaching and outreach ministries of various kinds all around London. The tune *Hankey* was composed by William G. Fischer (who added the refrain). In the ensuing years, the hymn became a popular one in both England and the United States.

How Firm a Foundation first appeared in 1787 in John Rippon's *A Selection of Hymns*, a collection of texts by Isaac Watts and "a selection of the best authors." Rippon was a very popular and influential dissenting minister of his time, and became famous and wealthy through publication of

this hymnbook. In the book, authorship of *How Firm a Foundation* is attributed to "K," likely one R. Keene, who lined out the text for printing. The poignant, pentatonic tune is an American folk melody specifically adapted to this text. Text and tune together point confidently to the Word of God as our ground of authority, security, and hope.

In Christ Alone has quickly become a favorite of many believers the world around. Keith and Kristyn Getty along with Stuart Townend artfully combine distinctive Celtic echoes, essential Christian doctrine, and evocative, memorable music in a new style of hymn that sounds at once contemporary and traditional.

Henry van Dyke, one-time pastor of New York City's Brick Presbyterian Church, penned the words of *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* while lecturing at Williams College. His son related the story that at breakfast one morning van Dyke placed a manuscript poem on the table before President James Garfield and said, "Here is a hymn for you. Your mountains were my inspiration. It must be sung to Beethoven's 'Hymn to Joy'." *Hymn to Joy* was adapted as a hymn tune by Edward Hodges of Trinity Church Wall Street from Ludwig van Beethoven's setting for Friedrich Schiller's 'An die Freude' used in the final triumphant movement of his monumental 9th Symphony.

Sing to the Lord a New Song is the third in a trilogy of anthems by Craig Courtney titled Three Sacred Canticles. A "Canticle" is simply a song or chant, but often thought of as one whose words are taken from Scripture. The perspective of Courtney's trilogy is that each canticle text refers to singing. In the other two, he uses Zephaniah 3, where we find God rejoicing over us with singing; and Ephesians 5 (as in Colossians 3), where we are encouraged to "let the word of Christ dwell richly in us," as we "speak to each other with psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs." In this canticle, Courtney uses a conflation of texts from Psalms 96, 98, and 100, where we sing to God new songs out of hearts renewed and refreshed by God's grace, mercy, and love, and in response to all God's provisions and initiatives on our behalf.

Praise God, from Whom All Blessings Flow, otherwise known as "The Doxology," is by Thomas Ken, a 17th century Anglican preacher and poet. He included the words as the final verse of both "Awake, My Soul, and with the Sun," and "All Praise to Thee, My God, This Night," the morning and evening hymns in his A Manual of Prayers for Use of the Scholars of Winchester College (1695). The words of course are best known as sung to Old Hundredth from the Genevan Psalter (1551). "Doxology" is an amalgamation of two Greek words (doxa and logos), literally translated "Word of Glory." The "Doxology" is a fundamental Trinitarian formulation and acknowledgment that we worship the Holy God of Glory made known to us in history and Scripture, but preeminently by the power of the Holy Spirit in the person and work of Jesus Christ.

Here I Am, Lord is a product of late 20th century renewal movements among American Roman Catholics. It was written in 1980 by Dan Schutte for a diaconate ordination service. He tenderly captures in word and song that our neighbor is to be our very great concern because our neighbor is God's very great concern.

Eugene Thamon Simpson's arrangement of the Spiritual *Hold On* serves as our benediction response today, with our Lord's own words ringing in our ears, "No one who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of heaven."
