June 12, 2016, 10:45 am Washington, DC Worship is not merely something we *attend*, but something we *do* together. We are less concerned with whether we are being entertained, and more interested in being edified – a biblical term conveying a sense of being "built up" or "strengthened."

At the root of this is *doxology*, words of glory offered to God, and lives that bring glory to the holy and righteous, but merciful, gracious, and steadfastly loving God that God is. The Old Testament prophet Isaiah and the New Testament book of Revelation both offer striking glimpses of God in glory, and how the brilliance of that glory penetrates the depth and illuminates the breadth of human need.

When we sing the great hymn "Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty," we are acknowledging as much our plight apart from God as we are acknowledging God's total and unique moral majesty. Holiness is what makes God, God. It shows us in relative but exquisite relief who we are and what we need. That need is not partial, but total.

Whatever else we might say of Christian worship, what we must repeat again and again is the prophet Jeremiah's assertion that God wants to be found:

When you seek me, you will find me, if you search with all your heart.

I will let you find me, says the Lord.

JEREMIAH 29:13-14

God says, "I love you." As in any other relationship, the only satisfying response is, "I love you, too." In Christian worship this tremendous and tender exchange is available as nowhere else.

PROGRAM NOTES

Mozart completed his first string quartet at age fourteen, during travels with his father in Italy. Leopold was keen to steep his son in Italian musical style and to introduce the teenager to influential composers and patrons while his youth (according to *Groves Dictionary of Music and Musicians*) could "still arouse wonder." Some eleven years or so later Wolfgang dedicated six more mature quartets (Op. 10), to Franz Josef Haydn, who told Leopold, "Before God, and as an honest man, I tell you that your son is the greatest composer known to me in person or by name." This morning's prelude excerpts two movements of Mozart's Quartet, Op. 10 No. 1, K. 387.

Words of our opening hymn of praise were written by Henry Van Dyke, one-time pastor of New York City's Brick Presbyterian Church, to be sung to Beethoven's *Ode to Joy*. Van Dyke wrote *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* while preaching at Williams College in the Berkshires in Massachusetts. He presented it one morning at breakfast to President James Garfield. "Here is a hymn for you," he said, "Your mountains were my inspiration." This striking melody originally set Friedrich Schiller's verse, "An die Freude," in the fourth movement of Beethoven's monumental *Ninth Symphony*. The composer never heard it as he conducted it in his final public concert in 1824. He had already become completely deaf.

Softly and Tenderly is a sterling example of gospel hymns from the American revival tradition. Its tune name is *Thompson*, after its author, Will Thompson. It is reported that, shortly before his death, the great evangelist Dwight L. Moody said to Thompson, "Will, I would rather have written 'Softly and tenderly Jesus is calling' than anything I have been able to do in my whole life."

Blow Ye the Trumpet, Blow! first appeared in 1750 under the title "The Year of Jubilee," based on Leviticus 25:9-10,

Then you shall have the trumpet sounded loud, on the tenth day of the seventh month – on the day of atonement – you shall have the trumpet sounded throughout all your land. And you shall hallow the fiftieth year and you shall proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants.

Charles Wesley's text is included in virtually all American Methodist hymnals. Its tune *Lenox* forms the basis for Ann Frohbieter's anthem setting dedicated to the late Lloyd Pfautsch, eminent and beloved composer and choral educator at Southern Methodist University.

Beautiful Savior is otherwise known as *Fairest Lord Jesus* ("Schönster Herr Jesu") sung to a Silesian tune known as *Crusaders Hymn*. With roots among 17th century German Jesuits, the text was adapted and adopted in several German collections and hymnals. It was first translated into English in 1850. The "Beautiful Savior" verse is from one of its other English translations. Grace Chimes here plays an arrangement for handbells.

Isaac Watts was the father of English hymnody. He was fifteen when he wrote his first hymn, ushering in a new style, method, and era. *My Shepherd Will Supply My Need* is his version of Psalm 23 published in a collection entitled *The Psalms of David Imitated in the Language of the New Testament, and Applied to the Christian State and Worship*. Watts' collection was first published in the United States by Benjamin Franklin. *Resignation* is an American southern folk tune from the early 19th century.

The African-American spiritual *Go Down, Moses* hearkens to events in the Old Testament book of Exodus, when God told Moses to demand that Pharaoh release the Hebrews from their long slavery in Egypt. Many years later, in Deuteronomy, after years of wilderness wanderings, Moses called the Israelites to remember that this defining moment in their history happened because of God's lovingkindness – his loyal, faithful, covenantal love for them based on the promises he had made in Genesis to Abraham and his descendants. This morning's arrangement is by Gary Davison, organist and Choirmaster at St. Francis Episcopal Church in Potomac, Maryland.

Charles Wesley wrote over 6,000 hymn texts. He was the eighteenth child of Samuel and Susanna Wesley, a life-long Anglican priest and, with his brother John, one of the founders of Methodism. His *Love Divine*, *All Loves Excelling* is here set to the stirring Welsh tune *Hyfrydol*.

G. F. Handel placed the soprano solo *If God Be for Us* near the very end of his oratorio *Messiah*, summing up the story of redemption unfolded throughout this theologically-rich work, and leading to the final chorus of praise, "Worthy Is the Lamb."

Christ Victorious, Christ Now Reigning was written only a little over ten years ago by American composer and conductor Stephen Caracciolo. He named the hymn tune Christus vincit, and arranged it as a magisterial anthem for choir, brass, organ, and timpani. The text is a veritable compendium of theology pointing to some central aspects of Christ's person and work. Most importantly for the sake of our worship this morning, its theology incites doxology: Alleluia! Alleluia!

Praise God, from Whom All Blessings Flow, is best known as "The Doxology." It is a text by Thomas Ken, a 17th century Anglican preacher and poet. He included the words as the final verse of both "Awake, My Soul, and with the Sun," and "All Praise to Thee, My God, This Night," the morning and evening hymns in his A Manual of Prayers for Use of the Scholars of Winchester College (1695): The words are most often sung to Old Hundredth from the Genevan Psalter (1551), but this morning are sung to the joyful German tune Lasst uns erfreuen.

Reformation churches emphasized congregational singing in various forms such as the German *chorale* in Lutheran circles and *metrical psalms* among Calvinists. Our congregational singing today ends with one of the most recognized and beloved *chorale* melodies: *Ein' feste Burg*, adapted around 1529 by Martin Luther for his text *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*. This great hymn became the rallying cry of the Protestant Reformation. Based on Psalm 46, there are over two hundred translations of Luther's poem in use today. The 1852 version used here is by American Frederick Henry Hedge. The source of Luther's melody is uncertain – perhaps an adaptation of a Gregorian chant, or perhaps even a popular tune.

Our final choral response is Peter Anglea's *Benediction*, here titled *God Be with You Till We Meet Again*. Anglea is a young American composer. With lyrical and tender simplicity, this new setting of a treasured text of blessing and farewell powerfully and deeply touches us with secure hope of the resurrection, and assurance that we will one day be gathered together in our Savior's embrace.


